Once again we are with the months of Nisan and Iyar. As we all know Nisan was once considered to be the beginning of our year – no doubt because it was the month of spring and it seemed that all Creation awoke from its deep, long slumber. This was the beginning of the agricultural activities. We woke up too, cleaned out our homes (the all too well known ‘spring clean’) and began to go about our outside lives.

In modern times, two other remembrances were added – Yom HaShoah and Yom HaAtzma’ut. We cry and we rejoice.

Our greatest freedom festival is Pesach. We could not help ourselves, so God had to directly intervene to save us. For all our other freedom festivals – Channukah, Purim – we were in another “place” and with God’s

help we were able to stand up to our oppressors and, not only did we survive but we thrived.

I believe that Yom HaShoah and Yom HaAtzma’ut parallel Pessach and Channukah. During the Shoah, we did not have independence and were totally dependent on others to save us.

Even though there were several hundreds of thousands of Jews in the British Mandate, the British did not want us to join in the fight against the Nazis, did not want to train us and did not want us in their army. We managed to train a number of young Jews who were to be parachuted behind Nazi lines to help the Jews there to organize and to perhaps be able to save themselves. All of the seven young Jews were found by the Nazis and murdered. The allies were much more concerned with “hitting” the Nazis than saving innocent civilians, we Jews. Even before the War the British would not give “papers” to Jews of Germany to come to the British Mandate. Even this country would not allow Jews entry on the empty quotas of the various European countries.

In the “Thank You” we say after we have eaten, the Birkat HaMazon, we ask God to ensure that we should not be dependent on others.

In 1948, one of the greatest miracles happened, the reemergence of an independent Jewish country – thank you President Truman!

Since then we celebrate our independence, that Jews can come to the aid of other Jews – the Jews from the former

Soviet Union; from Ethiopia; from Argentina; from France... not only Jews from countries where they are oppressed, but any and all Jews who want to live in the Jewish homeland.

In Israel, we Jews can and, unfortunately, have to defend ourselves from far too many enemies. In Israel we are like the Maccabees who were able to overthrow their Seleucid overlords and become their own masters. We know our history and we try to learn from it. To us history is important, and our role in history is important.

So this month of April, which includes Nisan and Iyar, is so very full of our history which we celebrate and remember. We Jews know, all too well, that not all the moments of our history have been wonderful.

Conversational Hebrew: We will be starting a class for anyone

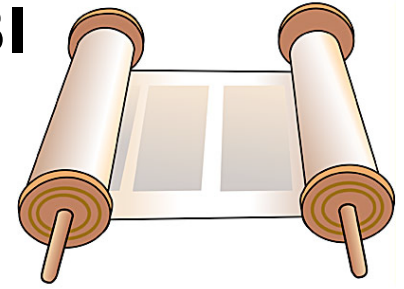

Brundibar/CYPRESS

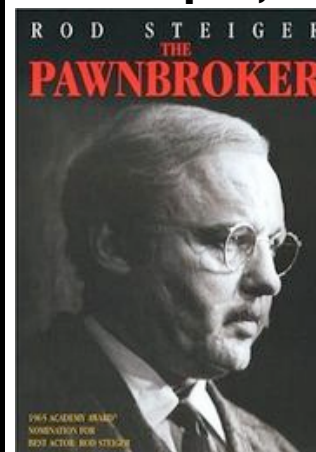

One of the age-old questions of Passover: What is Passover without matzoh balls!

Here are two different recipes. The first is courtesy of Sonnie Cibull:

Ingredients

2 large eggs, beaten
2 Tbsp chicken fat, melted
1/2 cup matzoh meal
2 Tbsp Club soda
1/8 tsp nutmeg
1/2 tsp salt
1/8 pepper

Beat eggs with chicken fat, salt, pepper and nutmeg. Add matzoh meal and club soda and stir together thoroughly. Chill for 1 hour. Bring together 2 qts water--bring to a boil. Form matzo balls about 1 inch in diameter. Drop gently into the boiling water.

IN THE KITCHEN - LOTS A MATZOH!

Reduce heat to medium and simmer--covered for about 30 minutes..Add to warm soup.

This second recipe was handed down from my father's mother Selma Kahn Levi.

Ingredients

6 matzoh crackers
2 TBSP chicken or goose fat
2 small onions chopped fine
Salt, pepper to taste
1/4 tsp ginger

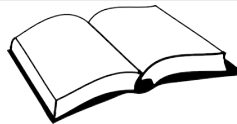
3 Tbsp of chopped parsley
3 eggs beaten
3 Tbsp matzoh meal

Soak matzoh crackers in water for 15 minutes squeeze dry through a colander.

Meanwhile in skillet sauté onion with chicken fat until onion is tender. Stirring constantly, add squeezed matzoh until crackers do not stick to skillet. Add salt pepper and ginger and accent. Once mixed, pour into large bowl. Add the 3 whole beaten eggs, parsley and matzoh meal. Matzoh is now ready to form into balls. Grease hands to keep mixture from sticking to you.

Traditionally we have used beef consommé as our broth but chicken broth is used as well. Once matzoh balls have been formed, drop in boiling broth. Once matzoh balls float to surface they are done.

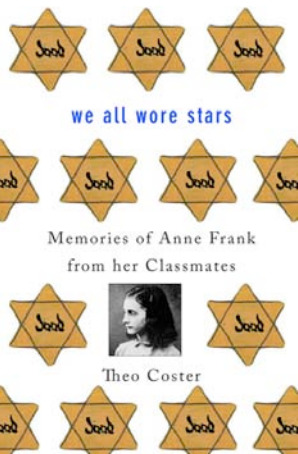
Inside Hana's Suitcase. A wonderful movie that parents should watch with their children. A battered suitcase from the Auschwitz Museum, with the name Hana Brady on it, is sent to the Tokyo Holocaust Museum.

The young middle school students work together to find out who Brady was and what happened to her. This movie, based on the best-selling book with the same title, brings together children of Tokyo, the Czech Republic, and Canada.

ADULT NON-FICTION

Brown, Erica. Confronting Scandal: How Jews Can Respond when Jews do Bad Things. This book explores the difficult and thorny issues surrounding scandals: airing dirty laundry in public, coming to terms with criminality among Jews, examining painful stereotypes of Jews and the difficult position of being a minority in society.

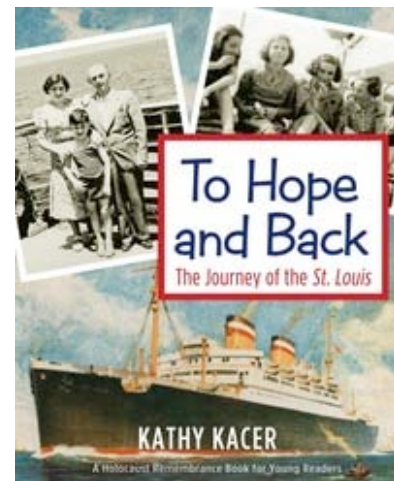
Coster, Theo. We All Wore Stars: Memories of Anne Frank from her Classmates. Surviving classmates from the Jewish Lyceum in



Amsterdam share their memories of Anne and their own survival stories of the Holocaust.

Lagnado, Lucette. The Arrogant Years: One Girl's Search for her Lost Youth from Cairo to Brooklyn. Lagnado continues the memoir she began in *The Man in the White Sharkskin Suit* and now focuses on her relationship with her mother.

Reuben, Steven Carr. Becoming Jewish: The Challenges, Rewards and Paths to Conversion. Reuben, a highly respected rabbi, and Jennifer S Hanin, Jewish by choice, lead readers



through the conversion process, providing the right mix of advice, resources and humor for the journey.

Today I Am A Woman: Stories of Bat Mitzvahs Around the World. Recollections of the first Bat Mitzvah at the only synagogue in Indonesia, a poignant Bat Mitzvah memory of World War II Italy, and an American Bat Mitzvah shared with girls in a Ukrainian orphanage — these are a few of the resonant testimonies about the transition from Jewish girl to Jewish woman collected in this new book.

CHILDREN/TEENS

Dominy, Amy Fellner. OyMG. Acceptance to a Christian-based Summer Camp makes Ellie feel it may be the ticket to a college scholarship. Even more exciting, she meets a very handsome competitor. But she begins to feel that the camp atmosphere is negative toward Jews. Will hiding her true identity be worth the prizes? A novel for grades 6 to 10 about a girl who learns to speak out for herself.

Heller, Linda. How Dalia Put a Big Yellow Comforter Inside a Tiny Blue Box. When Dalia learns about tzedakah, she creates a tzedakah box to keep the money she's saved to help those in need. Her little brother Yossi is curious about the Hebrew letters painted on the box. "Are those letters magic?" he asks. They must be because Dalia tells him she's putting a big yellow comforter, a butterfly bush, and a banana cream pie inside of it! How ever will she do it? K to-Grade 3.

Kacer, Kathy. To Hope and Back: The Journey of the St. Louis. The story of two youngsters, Lisa and Sol, is set against the tragic true history of the St. Louis. Denied entry from port after port, the captain was forced to return his Jewish passengers to Europe, where many died in the Holocaust. Through the eyes of Sol and Lisa, we see the injustice and heartbreak that were caused by the prejudice and hatred of so many. A fine addition to the Holocaust collection for young people, grades 5 and up.

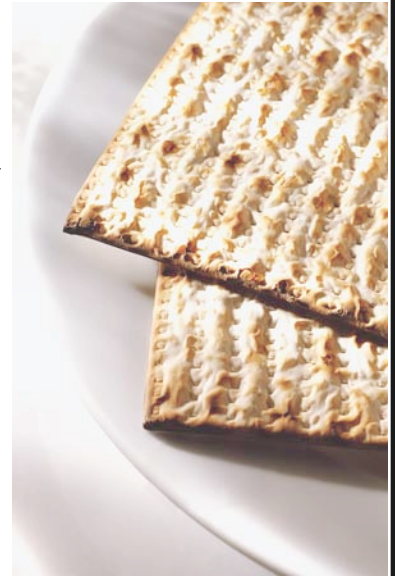
