April is upon us with its many festivals and remembrances: the last day of Pesach and Yizkor; Yom HaShoah and Yom Ha Atzma'ut. "Zachor" (remember-from which comes Yizkor) is the very underpinnings of the Jewish Nation. In the Tanach we are constantly commanded to ZACHOR what others had done to us lest we forget and do not learn. We are exhorted to ZACHOR what God has done, and is doing for us, lest we forget the brit/covenant.

One of the most important events, in modern times that we are to remember is the renewal of Jewish independence in our ancestral homeland. Few Jews seem to know that we are one of the only ancient peoples to still exist. The others have been relegated to textbooks, if at all. We are the only people, that I am aware of, and I am a student of history even if that be mainly Jewish history, to have survived

extensive exile. Two thousand years is very extensive exile!

We may have made our homes in various countries and even called them "our own"; we may even have prospered there--like we did in Spain during the "Golden Age". History happens and one friendly regime is often replaced by one that is hostile to Jews, like in Spain. This may take centuries to occur, but it seems a truism that it does occur.

I am not being pessimistic, just a realist who sees what has happened in history. Does this have to reoccur? Not necessarily if the host society also matures and becomes accepting of different groups in its midst.

The renewal of Jewish independence in the modern State of Israel must be viewed, at least by Jews, as one of the greatest miracles of our history. There are many Jews who wish to be accepted by their non-Jewish friends/colleagues/ society, and who are, at best neutral or at worst actively anti-Israel. A recent poll showed that only a little over 30% of liberals viewed Israel as an ally of the USA. This shows such a gross ignorance of the truth.

Many liberals, Jews included, insist that Israel has to be "holier than God" to be accepted as a nation among nations. Never mind that Israel is the ONLY democracy in the region; never mind that Israel has a far better record regarding women's rights and gay rights. The very values that the liberals demand of any society is condemned in Israel.

Most of us are aware of the phenomenal achievements in a wide variety of academic and applied science fields, and that Israel is a world leader in many of them. Never mind that Israel is among the 1st nations to send help to other nations ravaged by natural disasters or civil war. Israel has an army field hospital on the Syrian border that is treating war refugees. Israel is not perfect, neither is the "greatest nation on earth". Being imperfect is the human condition, it should not be condemned if striving for improvement is part of the values. The worst offenders of human rights are not vilified as Israel is. No one has yet uttered that North Korea, Iran, China or any dictatorship should not have the right to exist.

Placing the bar so high that ensures failure for Israel is antisemitism; even if it is dressed up in political rhetoric. Anti-Zionism, anti-Israel sentiments IS antisemitism. Fairness and justice demand that all are judged equally. Israel should be judged by the same standards as, say, France or England or even the USA. None is perfect, some are not even trying!

Yom Ha Atzma'ut is on the horizon, we Jews should be in the forefront of the celebrations. If you believe in God, then celebrate God's miracle and God's covenant with us. If you do not believe in God then celebrate the existence of a society that is trying to be "a light unto the nations".

But PLEASE celebrate.

CAJE ANNUAL RALLY

Many of our members are active in the wider community as volunteers, doing wonderful things for the betterment of all the people who live in the greater Evansville area.

This month Congregations Acting for Justice and Empowerment (CAJE), holds its annual rally. We hope to get 1800 participants from all the member congregations.

During this rally we will be asking the mayor and council members to take action on a few issues that CAJE is engaged in presently:

- 1) Homelessness among foster "children" who have aged out of the foster system, but have not been taught the tools for being independent adults, thus causing many of them to become homeless.
- 2) Jobs for released felons. Most employers do not want to employ

them when they discover that they were incarcerated causing greater recidivism, rather than rehabilitating them and allowing them to become productive members of society.

3) Homelessness among recently released felons (due to issue 2), and no public housing available for them. They may not rejoin their families if the family dwells in public housing.

Last year, our own Judge Wayne Trockman and his drug court were the recipients of CAJE's work.

Even if you do not wish to be active in any of these areas, please come to show that the Jewish Community of Evansville is interested and does "tikkun olam". Hope to see you there.



At the Yom Hashoah service and program on Sunday, April 7 at 6 pm, several members of CYPRESS, The Committee to Support Respect in Schools, will speak about their involvement with Steven Spielberg's Voices of the Shoah project.

On September 19, 2005, CYPRESS members, several Holocaust survivors, the press, and the general community gathered at Evansville's Central Library, for the dedication of CYPRESS'S gift to our community of 114 taped interviews of Holocaust survivors from Indiana, Kentucky, and Southern Illinois. Since that time, the interviews have been used, both in the library and in schools, for students and interested community members to understand more about the effects of this horrific time in our history.



Esta Berger's (Jeffrey's Mom) Chocolate Toffee Matzoh

5 matzohs (not egg)

2 sticks of butter

I cup packed brown sugar

I pound chocolate chips (either milk or dark chocolate)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line cookie sheet with heavy foil and spray with Pam. Lay Matzohs flat.

Melt butter - add brown sugar and boil slowly - (med-low) for 3 to 4 minutes stirring occasionally. Pour over matzohs and spread quickly and evenly.

Bake 5 minutes - remove from oven - sprinkle on chocolate chips - return to oven for one minute and remove. Spread chocolate evenly. Let cool. Refrigerate 3 hours and then break into pieces. Keep in plastic container or bag in the fridge. May be frozen. Enjoy, enjoy!


