From Our TABI President


Even in the dead of winter we have managed to keep busy with Temple activities.

Our Board of Directors arranged a visit from our URJ representative, Merry Lugasy, in January. She took

the opportunity to meet with several groups of congregants and our Rabbi Search Committee on Friday and then attended our Shabbat service led by Cheryl Brice and Samuel Dye. Ms. Lugasy conducted a fivehour retreat with our Board members on January 19 that was well attended.

We discussed some of the same issues that every small Jewish community faces including shrinking membership. She encouraged us to welcome warmly Jews new to Evansville and to involve them in our activities. including serving on committees that would interest them. In particular, the Social Enrichment Committee that provides organization and labor for our religious celebrations. meals, and lectures would be a good choice.

We also discussed the importance of communication. We are in the early stages of recruiting a new full-time Rabbi and we will strive to keep you abreast of the progress. The Board discussed with Ms. Lugasy our need to find a Rabbi who can help us resolve some of the differences that we have. Some of the discussion



pointed us in the direction of considering the benefits of recruiting an interim full-time Rabbi for one year. The primary benefit would be additional time to recruit a permanent full-time Rabbi. The Board will be considering this option (again) soon.

Certainly, we received a lot of compliments from Ms. Lugasy with respect to our people. We should feel encouraged to proceed.

TABI KITCHEN NEWS


The Temple Kitchen



ISRAEL--The Fourth Time!!

We did a couple different things on this trip than we had done before.

For starters, instead of a two week journey, we planned on three weeks. The cost of the ticket is the same so we decided let's take a little extra time.

We spent one week of the three in one place, in an apartment right in the middle of things. That place was Tel Aviv, our final location...but let's begin from the beginning!

We began our trip with a quick one night in Eilat and up early the next day to cross the border into Jordan and headed to Petra. An Arabian historical and archaeological city in the Jordanian governorate of Ma'an, Petra is famous for its rock-cut architecture and water conduit system.

Everything anyone has ever said about Petra is absolutely true. The visit includes a long walk along a narrow canyon, with the occasional sun ray shining through and quiet talking visitors anxiously waiting to come upon the most famous structure, the Treasury.

One sees it through a very narrow slit in the canyon, a splash of pink with the recognizable façade of the most visited place in Jordan. A guide gave an in depth of explanation of the area's history and of course, we probably could repeat about 5% of what was

explained! We spent the night in Petra and headed for Amman, the capital of Jordan AND the then home for Jennie Ebeling and her family while doing a research project!

Amman included a nice visit with Jennie, Menachem, and the girls, lots and lots of visits to different archaeological sites and some fabulous meals.

During one of our tours, we drove past the American Embassy and were most impressed with the obvious security in place around the compound. There were many tanks and armed personnel carriers as well as sharpshooters positioned on the walls surrounding the area.

We were told not to take photos, even with our phones. There are cameras filming every vehicle that passes by and if they see what appears to be someone taking photos, they will stop the vehicle and confiscate the phone or camera. We complied.

We crossed the border back into Israel at the Allenby Border Crossing, an ordeal that is tedious and not much fun. The Israeli security was tight but sparse, making for a very long wait.

In any event, another hour and we were in Jerusalem and ready to begin 3 days in that fabulous city. We had incredible weather so spent a lot of time walking and tried out the new light rail system which transects the city roughly east to west. We visited HUC and enjoyed a tour of the HUC Archaeologic Museum with David Ilan, our Scholar-in-resident speaker from this past November.

We picked up a car and drove up to nearly the northernmost town, Metulla, right on the Lebanese border. We had been there before and just spent three days hanging out, eating, taking photos and sightseeing. On the way up to Metulla, we met up with Norma Franklin, Jennie Ebeling's co-director for the Jezreel Dig and she gave us a tour of the site.

From there we headed to Tel Aviv for our last week. Chanukah was in full swing and that is school break so there were lots of kids around everywhere. We rented an apartment right in the center of town so had an easy time walking everywhere. We spent time in Jaffa, an incredible and beautiful town. The shops, restaurants, studios and scenery are invigorating and make one want to return time and again.

This is a rather rambling description of our visit. The truth is, one could write an article of any of the individual places we visited...I did post many of the photos I took on the TABI Facebook site and am working with Jennifer Wampler in putting together a Power Point and will share those with those interested sometime in March!



her freshman year at college, a near tragedy pushes her to uncover family truths and take a good look at the woman she wants to become.




ADULT NON-FICTION


