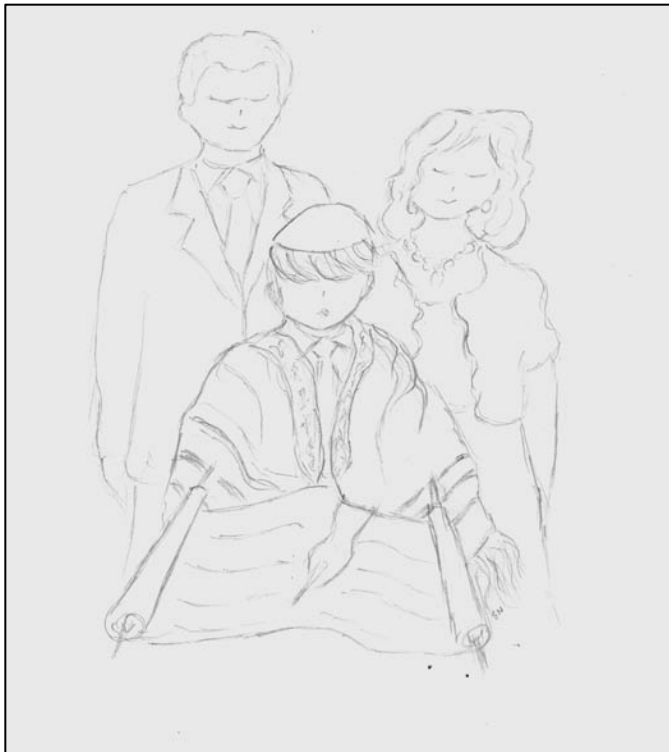

Rabbi Helen Bar Yaacov



This is the time when most of us are thinking about going on vacation, or have actually gone on vacation. Most of us take this time for granted. You work for most of the year, with a day here or there off, as well as the weekends, and you have earned your vacation.

Well, actually, no you have not. We take it as one of those things that western society has given us as one of our rights – maybe.

We Jews have been given, as a divine blessing, time of rest, that is, time off from earning our livelihood. That time is Shabbat; every seventh day is not to be like the other six days. Our ancient enemies considered us insane for wasting a seventh of our lives! Yet, we have more time off from work, not just the festivals and holy days, we have the shmitta year, the sabbatical year. This was a time of rest for the earth, to replenish itself, to rejuvenate.

The question then arose what were we the farmers, who now had a year off from working the farm, to do? What are we required to do on Shabbat? We are required to study!

But, haven't we been given time of rest? Why shouldn't we just loll around and do nothing? Why shouldn't we "party", get so drunk that we declare "hang Mordechai"? Study is work!

Oh, our beloved sages asked all these same sort of questions. We certainly are not the first.

When we recite the "Shema" we affirm that lifelong adult Jewish education is required of us. Our

sage Rabbis taught us that we have been endowed with a soul and with a brain. It is with the brain that we learn what it is that God requires of us. It is with our souls and bodies that we put that into action.

"Vacation" time is a Jewish value. Thousands of years ago the seventh day was to be so holy that even slaves became free for one day a week. We have been taught that every living creature needs to be replenished and recharged. For us Jews, the "man" on top of the "totem pole" has always been the scholar. The scholar/teacher is deemed higher than one's parents. When we study and then teach, we are preparing the future for those who come after us.

Resting from work, spending time with family and friends and, of course, with God, is a Jewish moral and ethical value.

I wish each of us a wonderful time free from earning our living. May each of us become refreshed and recharged. May we all have a wonder filled summer that feeds our souls as well as our bodies.

President's Report TABI Annual Meeting

I have a busy medical practice in Anesthesia at St. Mary's and that means that as President of this Synagogue, I rely on people to volunteer their time and their energy to make this a good Jewish center—for religious services, lectures, films, celebrations, and more. Because I invest a lot of time at work and the Synagogue, I don't get to sit and read as much as I'd like.

I did read a bit from attorney Alan Dershowitz, who was asked what the future holds for Israel. His response was that for us Jews, "Prophecy ended with the destruction of the Second Temple in the 70CE." With that, he proceeded to make a few predictions!

I would like now to make a couple predictions regarding our temple:

- Next summer we will transition to a new spiritual leader.
- That new leader will be a Rabbi and almost certainly a full-time Rabbi.
- Shabbat services that Rabbi Bar-Yaacov is offering now, and for the last four years will continued to be offered – Friday evenings

and Shabbat mornings. She established a routine for Saturday morning services that must be maintained.

- I foresee the new Rabbi offering adult education classes in the evenings during the week. Again, this is something we did not have before, but which people here have come to appreciate.

Those are enough predictions with respect to a new spiritual leader!

As for our social activities for the next year, you will hear from the Enrichment Committee. My only comment is to encourage all of you to take the time to join us here. I ask children to bring their parents and for grandparents to bring their grandchildren to some of the things the temple offers socially as well as spiritually. You can begin with Sunday, June 24th at 7pm: Judge Wayne Trockman and Lisa Seif will be here to discuss the Drug Court.

There are many people here for whom I have relied immensely for help: Jeff Berger for handling the finances along with the Financial Committee; Merral Lewis, our Board Secretary who has committed himself to this synagogue and served on our board for as long as I can remember; Dave Pellett, for taking care of this building; and Elana Stone, our past president for offering timely advice and insight.

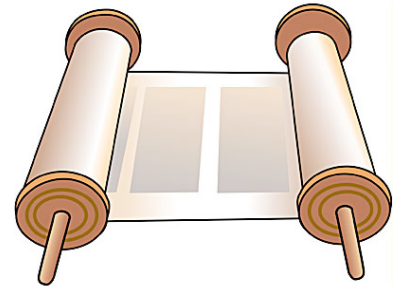
Thanks to Jennifer Wampler and Robynn Merkel for excellent work on the bulletin;

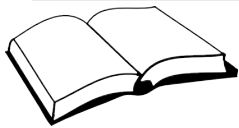

ADULT FICTION

Shapiro, Alan.

Broadway Baby. As a little girl growing up, Miriam Bluestein fantasized about a life lived on stage, specifically in a musical. As a woman,

she is both tormented and consoled by those dreams in her day-to-day existence with her family, including a short-tempered husband, a cranky mother, and three demanding children, one of whom shows real talent for the stage.

Segal, Francesca. **The Innocents.** A smart and slyly funny tale of love, temptation, confusion, and commitment; a triumphant and beautifully executed Jewish recasting of Edith Wharton's *The Age of Innocence*.

Glickman, Mary. **One More River.** A National Jewish Book Award Finalist, this is the sweeping story of a father and son, and of the loves that transform them amid the turbulence of the American South.

ADULT NON-FICTION

Batnitzky, Leora. **How Judaism Became a Religion: An Introduction to Modern Jewish Thought.** Is Judaism a religion, a culture, a nationality--or a mixture of all of these? Batnitzky

argues that this question more than any other has driven modern Jewish thought since the eighteenth century. This lucid introduction tells the story of how Judaism came to be defined as a religion in the modern period--and why Jewish thinkers have fought as well as championed this idea.

Werber, Millie and Eve Keller. **Two Rings: A Story of Love and War.** Born in central Poland in the town of Radom, Millie found herself trapped in the ghetto at the age of fourteen, a slave laborer in an armaments factory in the summer of 1942, transported to Auschwitz in the summer of 1944. Much later, Millie revealed

her most precious private memory: of a man to whom she was married for a few brief months. He died, leaving Millie with a single photograph taken on their wedding day, and two rings of gold that affirm the presence of a great passion in the bleakest imaginable time.

TEENS

Chibbaro, Julie. **Deadly.** In the early nineteenth-hundreds, sixteen-year-old Prudence Galewski leaves school to take a job assisting the head epidemiologist at New York's Department of Health and Sanitation, investigating the intriguing

case of "Typhoid Mary," a seemingly healthy woman who is infecting others with typhoid fever. An exciting story sure to please readers. Grades 7-10

Thor, Annika. **The Lily Pond.** Having left Nazi-occupied Vienna a year ago, thirteen-year-old

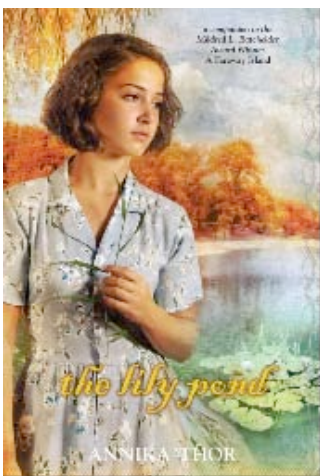
Jewish refugee Stephanie Steiner adapts to life in the cultured Swedish city of Gothenburg, where she attends school, falls in love, and worries about her parents who were not allowed to emigrate. This book is a sequel to *A Faraway Island*, also in our library. Grades 7-10.
