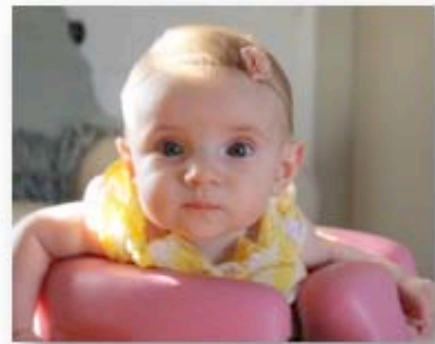

We will be having a plethora of blessings this coming month.

Josh Dinner will be the cantorial soloist again, and we will joyously celebrate Shabbat. Shavu’ot is at the end of the month and we will be celebrating God giving us the Torah; without which we would not be Jews and the Western world would not be as it is.

In the middle of the month Kate and David will be having the naming of their beautiful child.

Kate and David are following in the footsteps of all those generations before us who have brought their blessings, their children, under the “wings” of the Sh’china

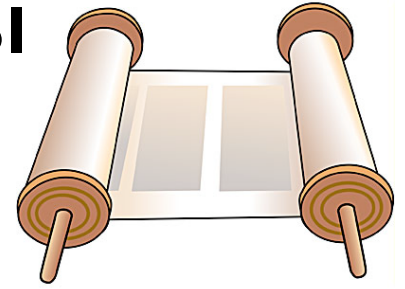

# 35th Annual Easter Seals Telethon raises record \$1,023,510 for Easter Seals Rehabilitation Center.

**Final "tote"  
exceeds \$1 million  
for first time!**

**The 35th annual Easter Seals Telethon ended at 6 p.m. Sun., April 15, with a record-setting "final tote" of \$1,023,510 raised for the Easter Seals Rehabilitation Center.**

The total exceeded this year's Telethon goal of \$985,000; last year's total, which set the previous record, was \$980,060. All proceeds will underwrite therapy for tri-state children and adults with disabilities served by the nonprofit Easter Seals Rehabilitation Center in Evansville.

**Helping to raise the record total was a surprise challenge from**

## **National Easter Seals.**

The national organization announced it would match up to \$10,000 in local phoned-in pledges during the last hour of the show, in honor of Evansville resident **Ben Trockman**. Ben is the 2012 National Easter Seals Adult Representative and made several appearances throughout today's local Telethon.

Also instrumental to the Telethon's success was the generosity of the E'ville Iron Street Rod Club, a group of local street rod enthusiasts who are among Easter Seals' largest supporters. During last year's Telethon, the grand total of E'ville Iron's annual contributions to Easter Seals exceeded \$1 million, and the club donated an additional \$78,000 on this year's show.

Many other individuals, businesses and groups also presented checks. Several "Pacesetters" – local volunteers who sought advance donations from friends, relatives and colleagues – reported their totals. Many people dropped off donations at the Vectren "fish bowl". Local companies and civic organizations answered phones from viewers calling in pledges. Other businesses and groups competed to funds from

This year's show was dedicated to John H. Schroeder, local businessman and community leader who was a longtime supporter and former Easter Seals board chairman. Mr. Schroeder passed away April 4, 2011.

Among the stories featured on the 6-hour broadcast were those of 2012 local Youth Representative Matt Dotson, 16, of Henderson, KY, and local Child Representative Ali Shanks, 7, of Evansville, IN.

The live show ran from 12 noon to 6 p.m., with nearly 200 volunteers involved. Hosting on behalf of WEHT Local/Local 7 were veteran Telethon hosts Brad Byrd and Wayne Hart, who were joined for the first time by Eyewitness News colleagues Randy Moore and Ron Rhodes, in addition to guest host Shelley Kirk. **WEHT Local is the only station in the U.S. donating 100% of production and air time costs for a local Easter Seals Telethon.**

Mayor Lloyd Winnecke appeared on the broadcast to proclaim April 15, 2012, as "Easter Seals Day" in the City of Evansville. The following individuals and organizations received

### CHILDREN/TEENS

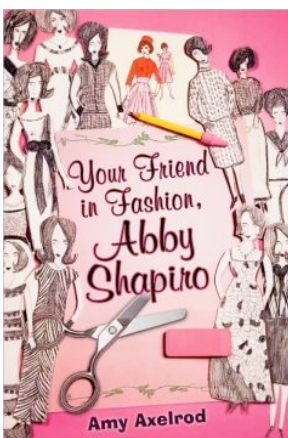

This is the story of two people who made a very important decision in their lives; a decision that resulted in a trip to Indianapolis on a cold, wintry, windy and rainy day in January of this year when they converted to Judaism with the help of Rabbi Helen Bar-Yaacov. They completed this action in the mikveh at Congregation B'nai Torah.

## OUR NEWEST MEMBERS OF ISRAEL SONJA ESKIND

Let me start with Sam Dye. Sam read an article in the newspaper that described a class being offered in Judaism. He decided to try and see if he liked it and was encouraged to attend services at Temple Adath B'nai Israel. He since attended occasionally but he really became more interested in Judaism after he met Rabbi Feder in the late '90s. He learned more, took more classes, started adapting to the Jewish way of life but was not ready to fully commit himself. When Rabbi Bar-Yaacov came to Evansville that all changed. She opened the door to a world that was closed before. The land of Israel became a country of contemporary people; the land itself became the place where people described in the Torah lived, where laws of Torah became the law of the land. Sam had his discussions with Rabbi, started helping teach at the Sunday school and obviously was ready to go forward.



Deanna Miller's story is different. Her family hails from Morocco. Hers is an old Jewish family. Her great grandfather was a rabbi who around the year 1850 traveled on a donkey to visit his flock. His life was described in a book describing Jewish life in Morocco in the early to mid 19<sup>th</sup> century. After World War II her mother met and married an American Navy man who was stationed in Morocco and came to America. Regretfully, Deanna did not grow up practicing Judaism but always remembered her roots. Rabbi Bar-Yaacov's adult classes in Hebrew and Jewish history strengthened Deanna's resolve to once again become Jewish and go forward.

Generally, a rabbi will not encourage conversion and usually agrees to it only after it is determined that the intended Jew-by-choice is seriously committed. Then the rabbi will take him or her on and subject the student to rigorous education of the Jewish faith; teach him or her to read Hebrew (maybe not understand all of it yet); familiarize them with the Holy Days and Festivals; Shabbat services and make them understand the Jewish way of life. Reading and studying the Tanakh is not a small portion of this.

Conversion is not to be taken lightly. It is a life changing experience, and when you ask both new members of Israel they will tell you how happy they are to have made the choice.
